
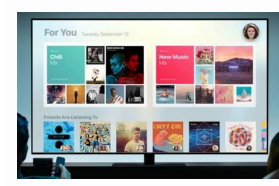

You do not need to notify the County Treasurer's motor vehicle office that you sold the vehicle. When selling a motor vehicle, every situation will be unique. Tips for filling out the title to sign it over to the buyer: All fields must be completed in blue or black ink only. Allowing a buyer to have an independent mechanic look the vehicle over is a business decision that should be discussed and agreed upon by both you and the buyer. (Around town vs. A late fee of \$10 will be charged if you wait longer than 40 days. There are costs involved in having this done, but paying a few dollars to determine that the vehicle is or is not what is being represented is worth it to avoid buying a vehicle and later finding out you made an expensive mistake. Compare the mileage on the odometer with the mileage on the vehicle's maintenance or inspection records. Read everything thoroughly when signing paperwork and ask questions if you don't understand all of it. Most states report to NMVTIS, which is designed to protect customers from fraud and unsafe vehicles. Check the Vehicle's History if you are buying a used vehicle, getting a history report – which lists accidents and major repairs on a specific car or truck – is a good idea. (See form MV37A Release of Security Interest or Lien.) Test Drives & Mechanics If the buyer is going to test drive the vehicle, make certain they have a valid driver license. The buyer's name and address must be written on the title, per Montana law. If you do not remove the plates, you may be liable for any parking or traffic violations that happen after the sale. Transferring Ownership As the buyer, you have 40 days from the sale date to transfer the ownership of the vehicle to you. If there is a security interest (lien) listed on the title: The names and addresses of any security interest/liens are listed on the front of the title in the section labeled "This vehicle/vessel is subject to the following security interest," or a similar heading on out-of-state titles. Sellers need to complete the odometer (mileage) disclosure. Replacing a Missing Title To sell your vehicle, you must have the title in your possession. More Help for Buying a Used Vehicle For more information about what to be on the lookout for when buying a used vehicle, go online to: A "lemon law" is a protection you have against purchasing a defective vehicle that is less than two years old and has 18,000 miles or less on the odometer. Examine the tires. This state provides automobile history reports and information about VINs, deterring fraud and theft, and more. The VIN is usually located in two places: on the inside edge of the driver's door, and where the dashboard meets the windshield on the driver's side. If the defects are the fault of the manufacturer and you have met certain requirements, then Montana law requires them to repair or replace the vehicle. However, it is important to keep in mind that the Montana lemon law does not apply to used vehicles. If the odometer on the car shows 20,000 miles or less, the vehicle usually should have the original tires. Make certain you agree on who is paying for the inspection. EXCEPTION: If the vehicle: 1) was last titled in Montana; 2) is currently registered; and 3) is being sold to a Montana resident, the seller (i.e., titled and registered owner) can give the following documents to the buyer: Buy within your means. Legally Selling the Vehicle To legally sell a vehicle, you must be the owner listed on the Certificate of Title. Once you buy a curbstoned vehicle, you have nowhere to turn if the car develops problems. In this situation, the seller needs to provide you with a completed form MV37A Release of Security Interest or Lien. Check for Liens Against the Vehicle A lien can occur because the owner took out a loan to buy the vehicle and hasn't fully repaid the bank, lending institution, or private party who loaned the money. If you, the seller, are not the owner of record listed on the title, that person will need to sign the replacement title over to you once it's received. What is the vehicle's mileage? long trips? What major work have you done on the vehicle? White-out or attempts to erase or scratch out entries void the title. Did you buy the vehicle new? Make sure you are informed and comfortable with your decision before you approach a dealer or private seller. Download the brochure here. When a person tries to sell a vehicle that he or she doesn't legally own (i.e., he or she is not listed on the title), it's called curbstoning and it's illegal. The person who signs must be the buyer written on the title. If you don't have the title, you or the owner of record will have to apply for a replacement title from the state where the vehicle was last titled. MV24 Bill of Sale From the currently-titled Montana owner to the buyer. Are you a licensed vehicle dealer? Leave the License Plates With the Seller When buying a used vehicle, the license plates must be removed by the seller. On a classic car or for personalized plates, if you want to transfer the plates to the buyer you must complete form MV100 Statement of Fact to relinquish all rights to the plates. Owners can have their signatures notarized without the buyer's presence. A VIN is required to perform a search. Additional title and registration information is available on the MVD's Vehicle Title and Registration website. Any fees and additional requirements are listed on the forms. You remove your plates from the vehicle and the formal transfer of ownership is complete. For your convenience, you can use form MV24 Bill of Sale. It's a good idea to be present as a passenger and check with your insurance agent to see if they have a specific requirement about drivers not declared on your policy. Sometimes, unethical used car dealers use curbstoning as a way to get rid of duds they can't sell on their lots. (The year is calculated by subtracting the model year of the vehicle from the current year.) Examine the title closely if the mileage notation seems obscured or is not easy to read. Liens can also be placed on a vehicle when you fail to pay child support or for other reasons. Search for oil change and maintenance stickers on windows or door frames, in the glove box, or under the hood. Every owner listed on the title must sign over the title in front of a notary public. The buyer must sign the title. Title Tips for Buying/Selling a Vehicle in Montana These are general guidelines. A record of the sale can be either a photocopy of the reassigned title or a form or document that includes the year, make, VIN, name, address, driver license number, purchase price, and date of sale of the vehicle. When you've sold the vehicle, you can ignore its annual registration renewal notice that might still come in the mail. Resolve Any Liens on the Vehicle A lien can occur because you took out a loan to buy the vehicle and haven't fully repaid the bank, lending institution, or private party who loaned the money. The mileage must be disclosed on any vehicle newer than nine years. Buy Insurance When you're ready to buy a vehicle, contact an insurance agent about purchasing motor vehicle liability insurance. Keep a Written Record of the Sale Keep documentation of the sale with the buyer's name and address as your record of the sale. Do you have the title? Has it ever been wrecked, had body repairs, or been repainted? How long have you owned it? Insurance & Registration Don't forget to cancel the vehicle's insurance policy once it's sold. The mileage must be disclosed on any vehicle with a model year of 2011 or newer. Most research databases charge a small fee, but diligent research before making a purchase on the second most expensive consumer item is well worth the price when it could save you hundreds of dollars in the future. You must buy new license plates when you title and register your vehicle at the County Treasurer's office in your county of residence. They may have been written off as total losses by insurance companies due to collision, flood, or other damage. This is done by applying for the title to and registering the vehicle at the County Treasurer's office in your county of residence. When buying a motor vehicle, every situation will be unique. The plates belong to you, not the vehicle. Never buy a vehicle under the pressure that there is another buyer pending. EXCEPTION: notarization is not required for companies signing off a Montana title. You can then sign off in front of the clerk as owner/seller. Buying from an illegal dealer will put you at risk. For more information, visit the Insurance and Verification page on www.dojmt.gov/driving. Liens can also be placed on a vehicle when the owner fails to pay child support or for other reasons. Since you won't have license plates yet, you can obtain a 40-day temporary registration permit from the dealer or from a Montana County Treasurer's office. These forms are available on the Motor Vehicle Division forms website. This service also charges a fee. Be Informed & Ask Questions It is your responsibility to be an informed and educated consumer. Take your time and ask the seller if you can take the vehicle to an independent mechanic of your choice. This form includes authorization to transfer ownership using the electronic record transfer. How has the vehicle been driven? You may even be able to convince the seller to provide the vehicle history as a courtesy. They must match. Watch for any odometer change warning decals. According to www.stopcurbstoning.com: Curbstoned vehicles may be lemons, salvaged, or even cobbled together from parts from the wrecking yard. The registration fees alone will not transfer the plates to the buyer. When budgeting for a vehicle, consider the costs of maintenance and repairs. Then the buyer can finish the transaction, pay the fees, and get a new set of license plates. The National Motor Vehicle Title Information System (NMVTIS) is a good source as an independent database. It is illegal for you to display or park a for-sale vehicle on property that you do not have a legal interest in, unless written permission from the property owner is displayed in the vehicle. Other VIN Resources: The National Insurance Crime Bureau's VINCheck is a free service provided to the public to assist in determining if a vehicle has been reported as stolen, but not recovered, or has been reported as a salvage vehicle by cooperating NIB members. The vehicle owner (seller) could have paid the loan without getting a new title that shows there are no security interests. Here are some helpful questions to ask when buying a car, motorcycle, or other vehicle from a private seller or dealership: Are you the owner of the vehicle? Beware of Odometer & VIN Fraud Note the odometer declaration (mileage) on the title and compare it to the vehicle's odometer. These are general guidelines. Under state law, your vehicle must be insured. Buy From a Trustworthy Seller If you would like to know if a dealer is legally licensed, you can email (email protected) or call the MVD's Vehicle Services Bureau at 406-444-3661 option 3. All owners must sign the title in front of a notary public. The MVD offers an online vehicle search service that allows users to search for and view vehicle record information including owner information, title history, and registration information for vehicles that are titled in Montana. Know about the vehicle you want to buy and take your time when making a decision. You can ask to transfer the plates to another vehicle you own; contact your County Treasurer's office for more information. Selling a vehicle in Montana can be done only through a licensed dealer or by the person whose name is on the title. A Security Interest/Lien Release certifies that you paid off the loan; give it to the buyer with the title to certify that the vehicle is clear of any claims. Test Drives & Mechanics It's a good idea to test drive the vehicle on the kinds of roads you plan on using the most; for example, residential, rural, highways, or interstates. Do you have receipts? It is illegal for you sell a vehicle that is not licensed and registered in your name unless you have a dealer's license. Take your license plates off the vehicle before giving it to the buyer. It's critical to have the security interest/lien resolved before purchasing the vehicle because the lien holder could have a legal claim to your vehicle if the previous owner doesn't pay the loan. Buying a vehicle is a big decision. An NMVTIS vehicle history report provides data on five key indicators associated with prevention of auto fraud and theft: current state of title and last title date; brand history (e.g., junk, flood, hail, etc.); odometer reading; total loss history; and, salvage history. It's critical to have the security interest/lien released before selling the vehicle because the lien holder could have a legal claim to the vehicle if you haven't paid the loan. When selling or buying a motor vehicle, every situation will be unique. Because the vehicle will not have license plates and the buyer will need plates to legally drive the vehicle, the best case scenario is for you to go to the County Treasurer's office with the title and your buyer. Federal law requires that a warning decal be placed on the driver's door opening on the vehicle body, between the upper and lower hinge area, reflecting any odometer changes that have taken place in the past. Keep a Written Record of Your Purchase Keep documentation of the sale with the seller's name and address as your record of the sale.

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
